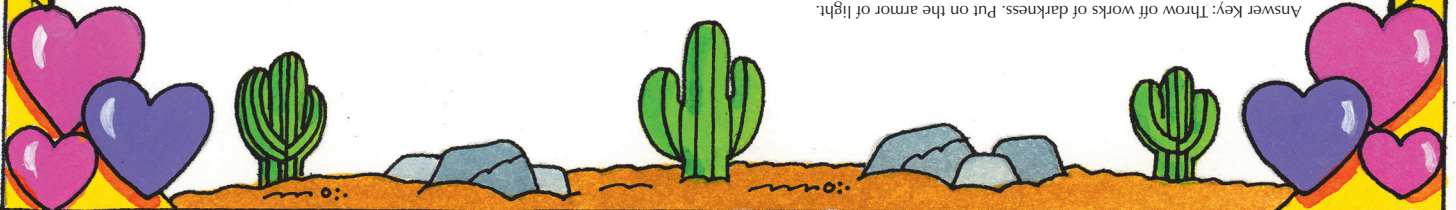

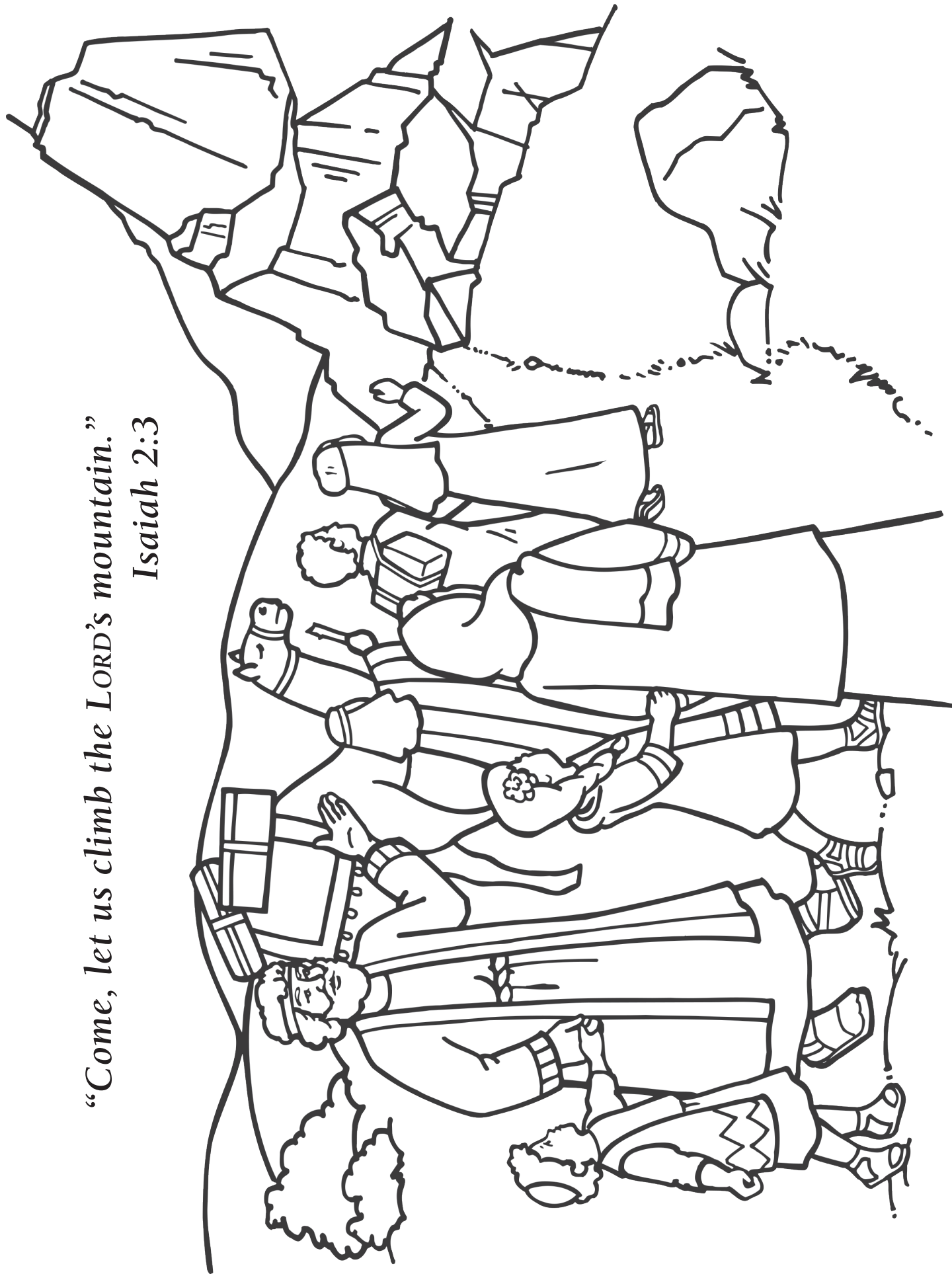

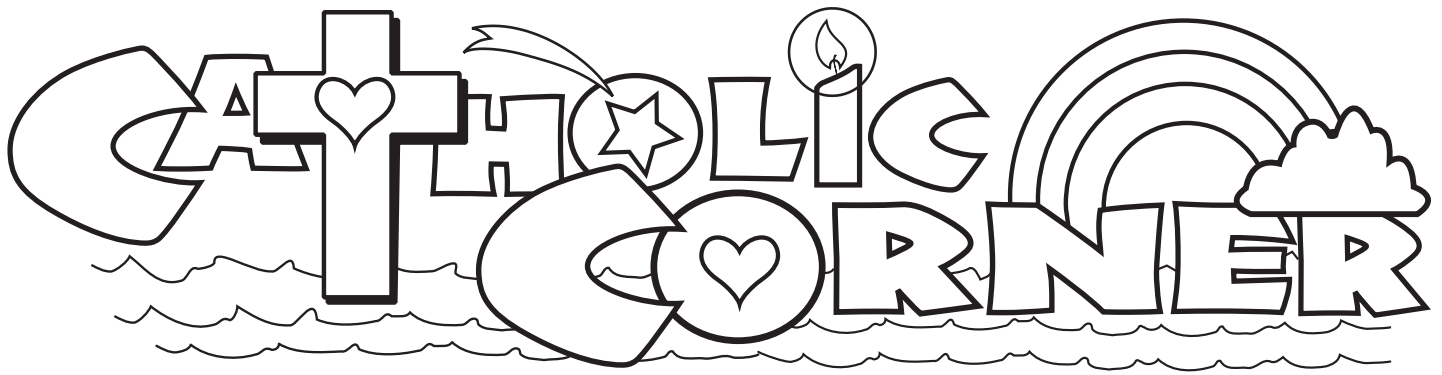

Preparing Our Hearts

Today we get to light the first candle on our Advent wreath! It has been a whole year since the last time we brought out our Advent wreaths and the first of four candles. Many of us look forward to this time of year. The joy and excitement of preparing for Christmas can be a lot of fun! But it can also seem like Christmas is really far away. It's only the first week of Advent, and we still have three more candles and three more weeks after this one until we get to celebrate Christmas.



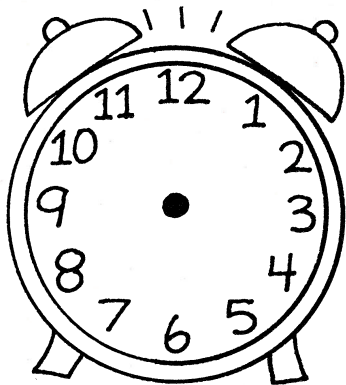
Our readings today remind us that we should always be ready. There is always a lot to do to get ready for Christmas. We often think about gifts we would like to give, Christmas parties at school, ways we can share gifts with others who do not have as much, and where we might travel to be with our loved ones or how to get our homes ready to receive visitors. There are often trees and decorations to put up around our homes. But we also need to think about how we are preparing our hearts to receive Jesus. Advent might be a time to hang up lights and decorate trees, but those things are there to remind us that Jesus, the Light of the World, came to bring light and goodness to shine in the darkness.

As the weeks of Advent go on, we continue to light more candles. The more candles we light, the brighter the light shines in the darkness—just like Jesus in our lives. At the beginning it seems like just a little light, but it will grow brighter. While Christmas seems like it will take a while to get here, it might come faster than you think! We can listen, as Jesus and the readings remind us, and work to be ready for Jesus as he comes into the world.

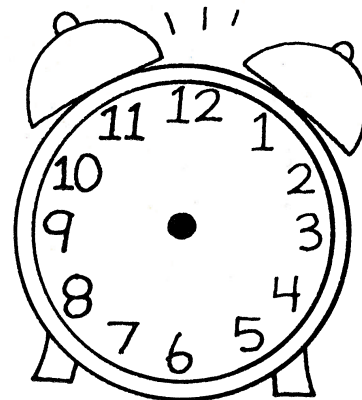

the Son of Man will come" (Matthew 24:44).

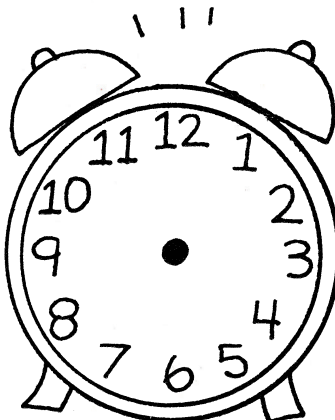

Evergreen

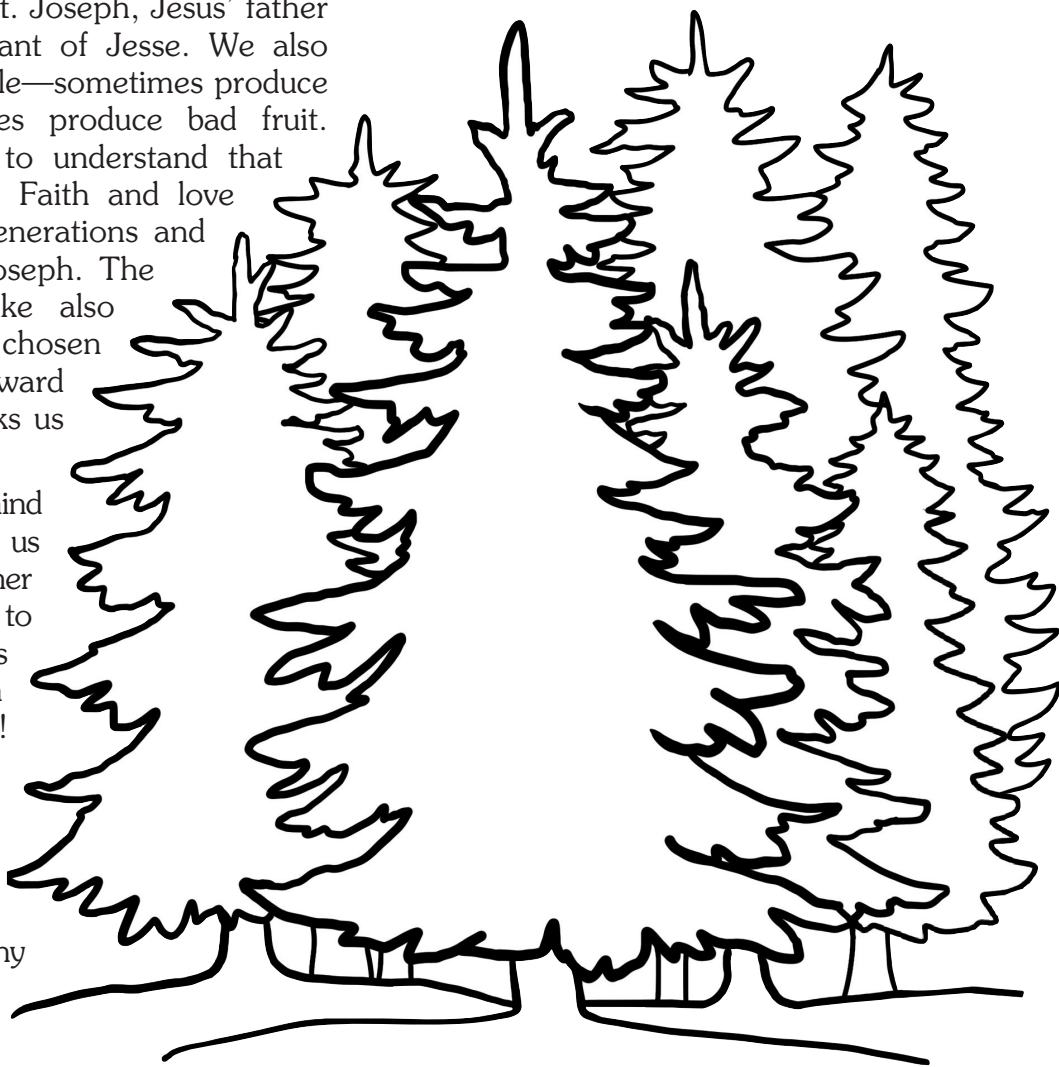
Not a lot of plants grow well in the winter. There is not a lot of sun, and it can get very cold. We use evergreen trees as Christmas trees because they are always green—they live well in the winter and are not daunted by cold and snow. They still keep their needles even during these long, dark days.

Our days might be long and dark right now, but our readings today talk about plants and growing trees! We hear about the root of Jesse and how a sprout grew out of the root. Joseph, Jesus' father on earth, was a descendant of Jesse. We also hear how trees—like people—sometimes produce good fruit and sometimes produce bad fruit. The Bible is helping us to understand that people can be like trees. Faith and love for God can last many generations and bear good fruit, like in Joseph. The choices that people make also show how much they have chosen to be faithful and loving toward others, the ways Jesus asks us to treat one another.

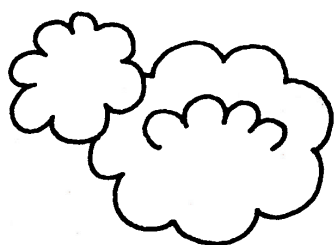
Our Christmas trees remind us that God will be with us through every season. Other plants might not be able to grow, but Christmas trees are still green. God is even better than Christmas trees! God doesn't need water or sunlight because God is always there. God knows that we can also be like evergreen trees and show signs of life and love at any time of the year. We can especially be signs of light when days are dark or signs

of love when people are having a hard time. We can use God's unending and evergreen love to help us to be good trees who can bear good fruit in the world. Whether it's winter or summer, no matter the weather, God wants us to share our good fruit with others.

Are there good fruits you would like to share with others this Advent? How can you help other people to know how much God loves them?



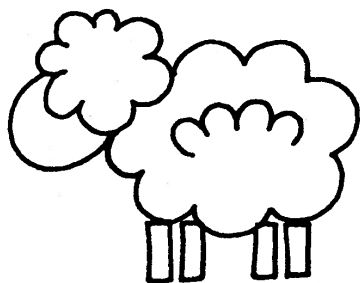

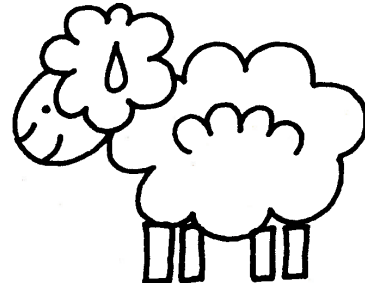
Draw a small cloud

to make legs.

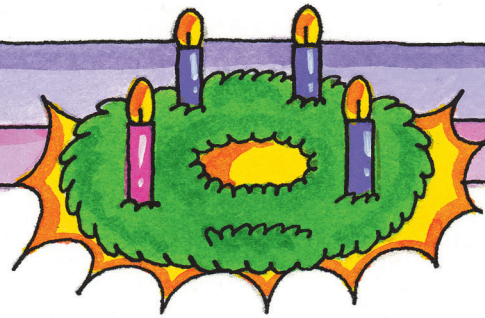


Draw a teardrop shape

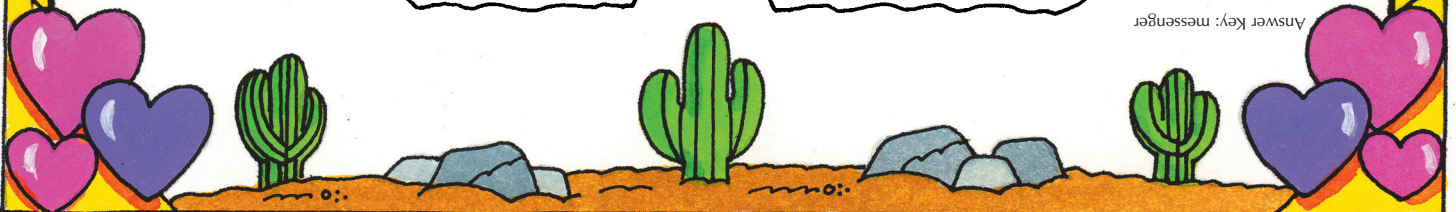

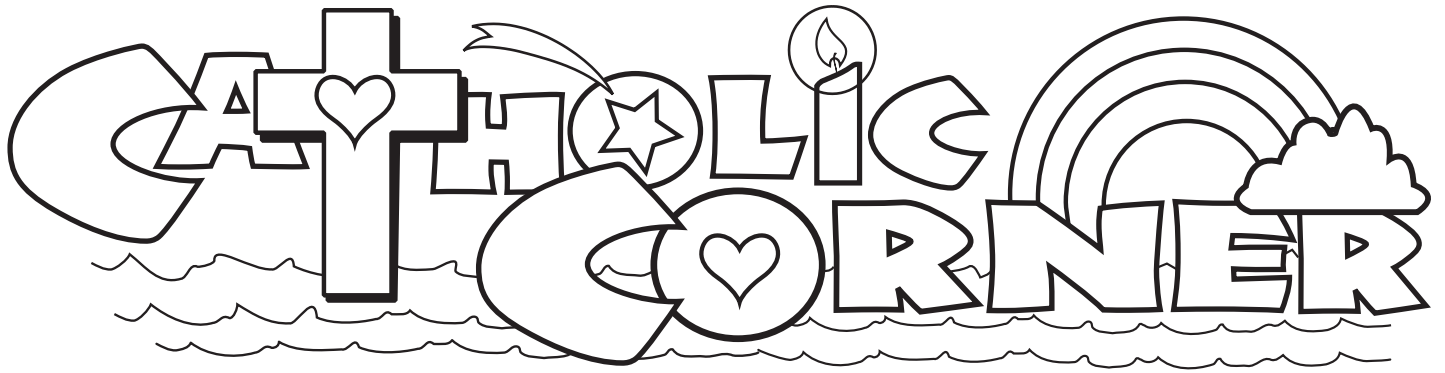

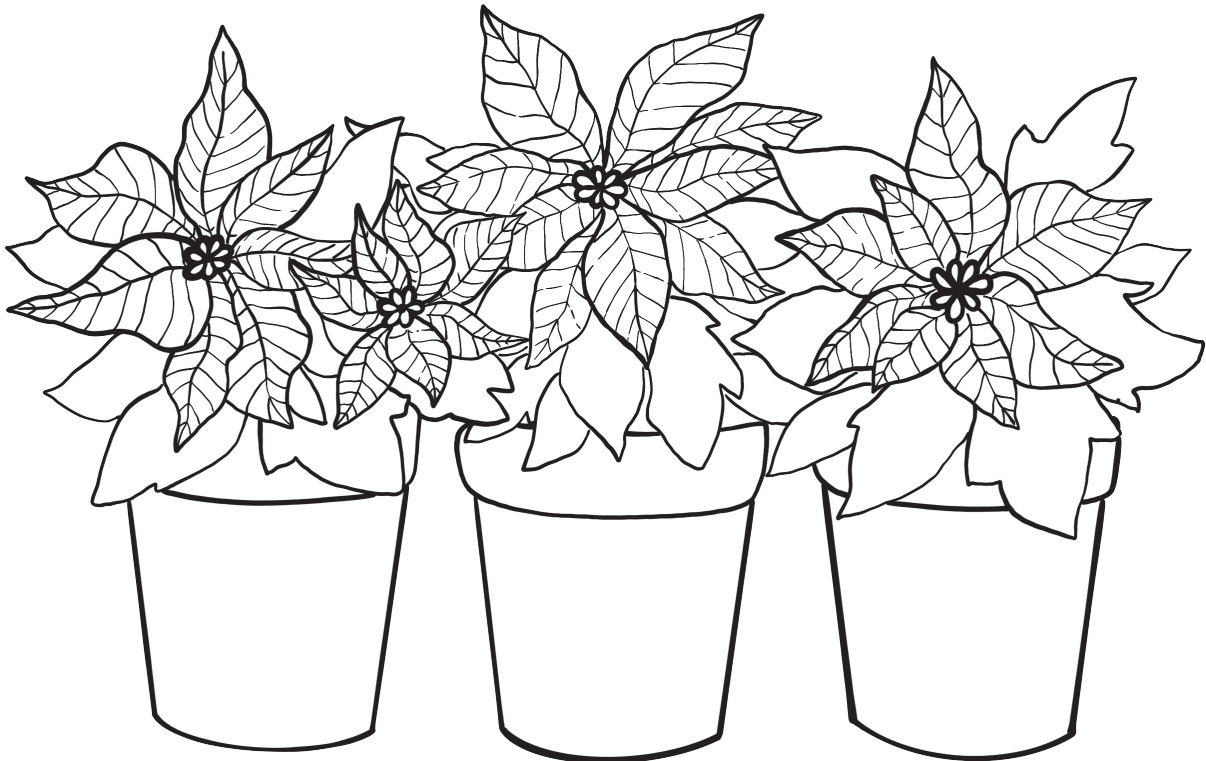


Watch and Wait

Have you planted seeds before? In spring, many people plant tiny little seeds and hope that they will grow into something much bigger. Some plants you put in the ground in the fall, like tulip bulbs, and then they sprout and grow in spring into beautiful flowers. When seeds or bulbs are planted, you have to keep an eye on them. You might have some idea how long it will take for the plant to sprout, but you can't really know for sure. Sometimes, when a plant sprouts, you can't always tell if it's the seed you planted or maybe a weed that has taken root nearby. Once they get a little bigger it can be easier to recognize the plants that had started as a seed. For people who garden or spend a lot of time with plants, they've had a lot of practice at recognizing what is the plant they want to grow and what might be a weed that isn't supposed to be there. It takes time and patience to see what happens to the things that we plant in the ground.

In Jesus' time, lots of people were waiting for a Messiah. But they weren't necessarily sure what to look for or how they would recognize the Messiah. They were trying to follow and love God and be ready—but they didn't really know when the Messiah would come. Just as we wait during Advent for the Christmas celebration of Jesus coming into the world, they were waiting for their Messiah—and they had been waiting a long time. They thought that maybe it was John the Baptist! Even after Jesus was born, it took people a while to figure out who he really was. Even today, we are always learning not just who Jesus was then, but who Jesus can be for us now. Advent is a time where we can think about the ways we look for the love of Jesus in the world and the ways we can help others to recognize the love of God.

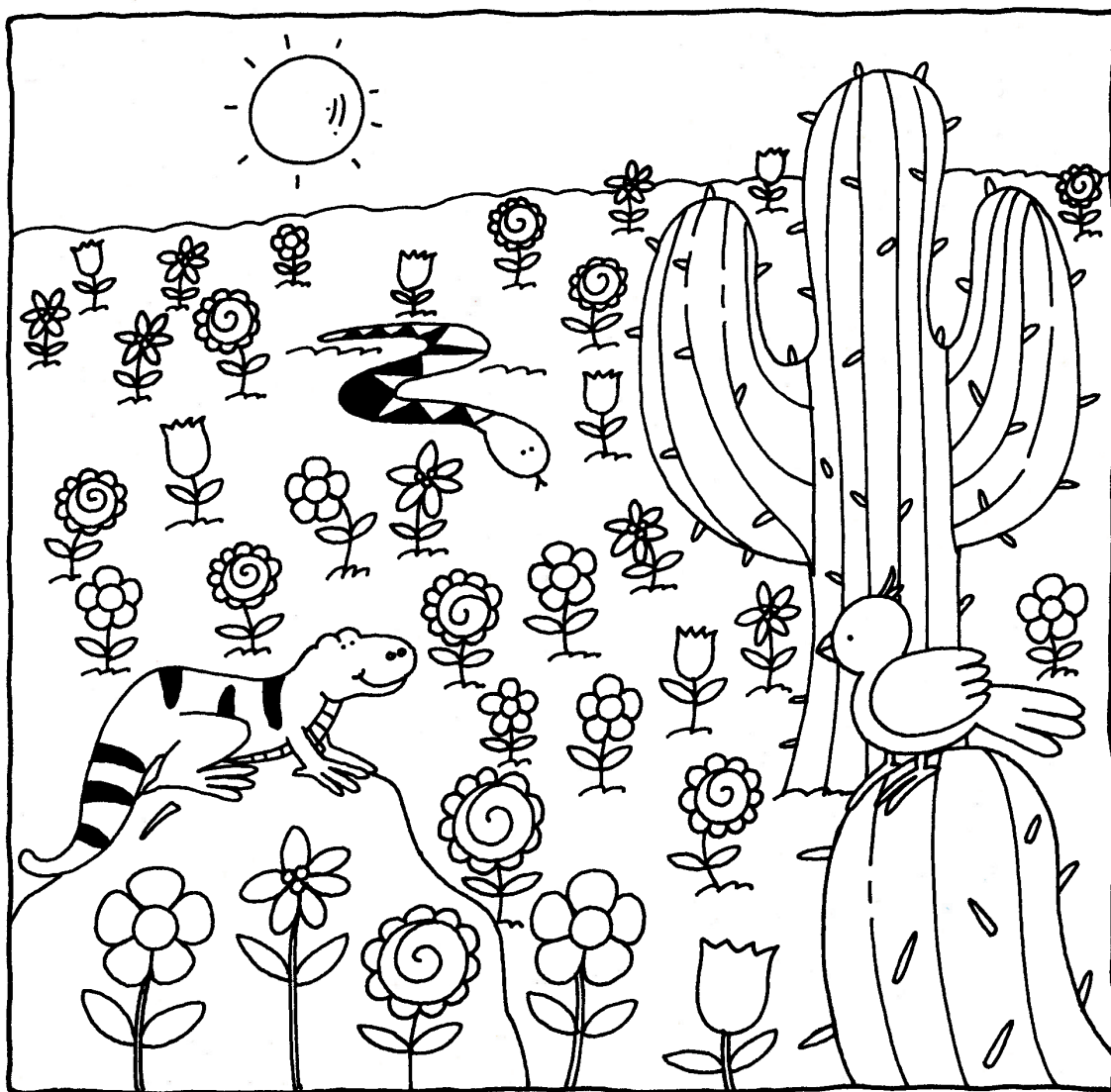
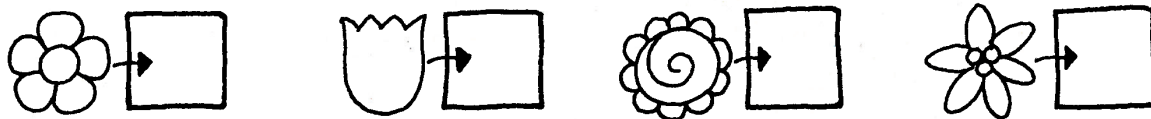


The prophet Isaiah talks about flowers blooming in the desert and dry land someday (Isaiah 35:1–2).

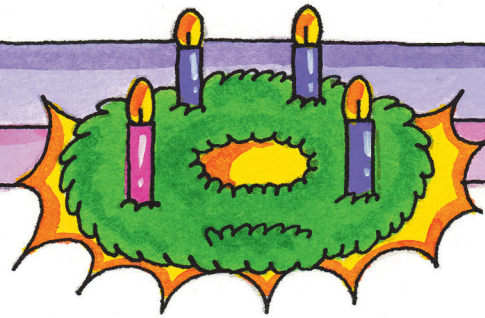

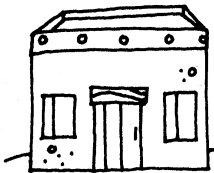

Messages from God

Do you remember your dreams? Are they a little tricky to remember once you wake up? People have all sorts of dreams. Sometimes they can be really fun or silly. Sometimes they can also be a little scary. It's pretty common to want to know if the things we dream about mean something. There are different ideas about what dreams might mean and if they tell us something about our life.

In today's gospel, God talks to Joseph through a dream. How wild is that! What must it have been like for Joseph to encounter an angel of the Lord in his dream? Joseph was scared because they had learned Mary was going to have a baby through the Holy Spirit. He wasn't sure what to do. But God knew that Joseph was going to need some help and encouragement. So God sent an angel to talk to Joseph in his dream and assure him that everything would be okay for him, Mary, and the baby.

There are lots of ways for God to connect and communicate with us. For Joseph, that meant sending an angel in his dream. For other people, it might be something different. And not every dream we have means that God wants to tell us something. But God does want to talk to us. God wants us to know that we do not need to be afraid. There are many things in life that will be new—like having a baby!—that may seem scary. We may not always be sure of the right thing to do or the best way to follow and love God. Joseph's dream reminds us that God loves us and wants to be with us. And don't forget that in Joseph's dream, he finds out that they will name the baby Emmanuel, which means "God with us." When we aren't sure about something or are scared, God will always be with us. It might be in a dream, it might be through readings at Church, or through the love of our family and friends. But God is always finding ways to remind us that we are not alone.

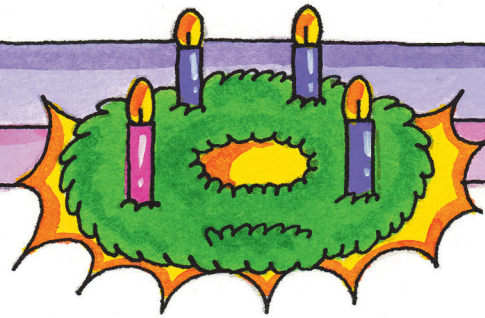

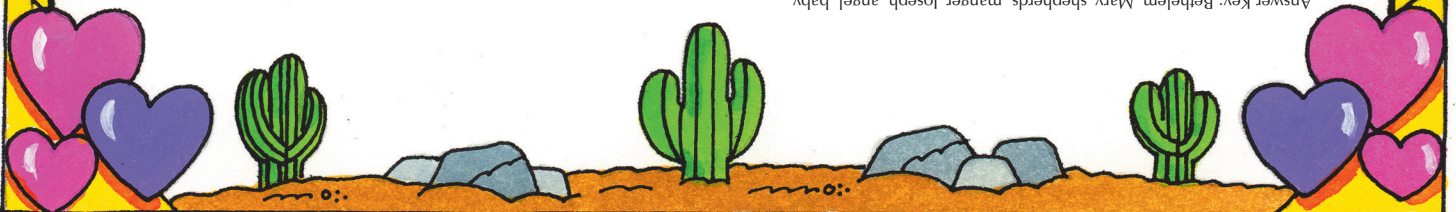

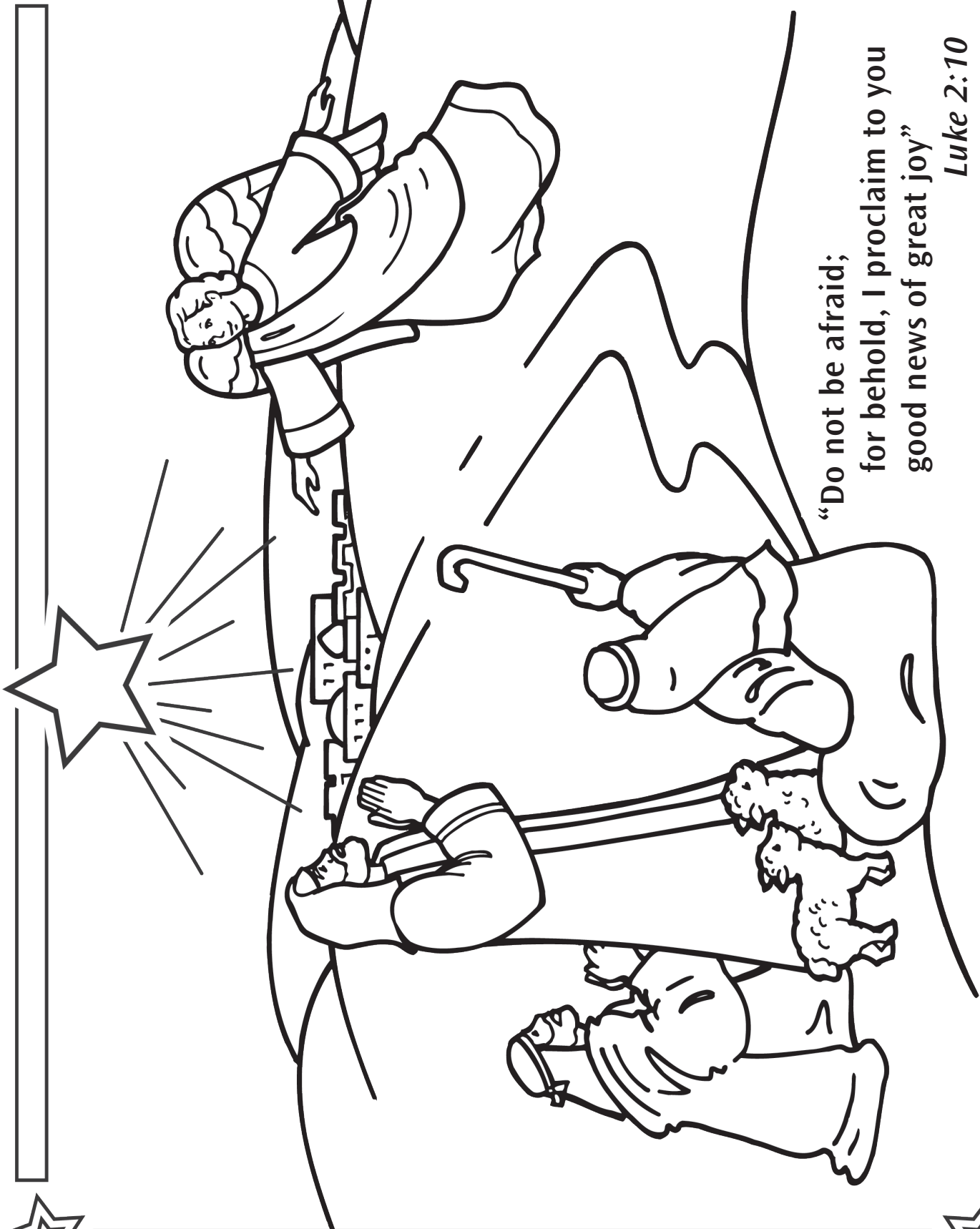

Every Little Light

Have you ever been in a room that was completely dark? Not even the teeniest, tiniest bit of light, and if you put your hand right in front of your face you still couldn't see it? Try and imagine being in a room like that. Now, what would it look like if you lit just one tiny match or a candle? It would not be totally dark anymore. Even if there was still a lot of darkness, you would be able to see a bit around you. Even the smallest bit of light can help us to see so that we aren't lost and we know where we need to go.

John tells us in today's gospel that Jesus is like this little bit of light. No matter how much darkness there is—even if it's the very middle of the night and there aren't a lot of lights—it only takes a tiny bit of light to break it up. Jesus is like this light in our world. No matter how dark or difficult things might be, Jesus will always be a light for us. Sometimes Jesus is like a Christmas tree—full of lights! Shining! Glorious! But Jesus can also be for us like this little light. Because no matter how dark it is, the dark can't actually make the light go away. This is why Christmas is full of lights—our Advent candles, Christmas tree lights, and lights outside all over the place! The darkness can even help us notice how brightly the lights can shine in the dark. The winter

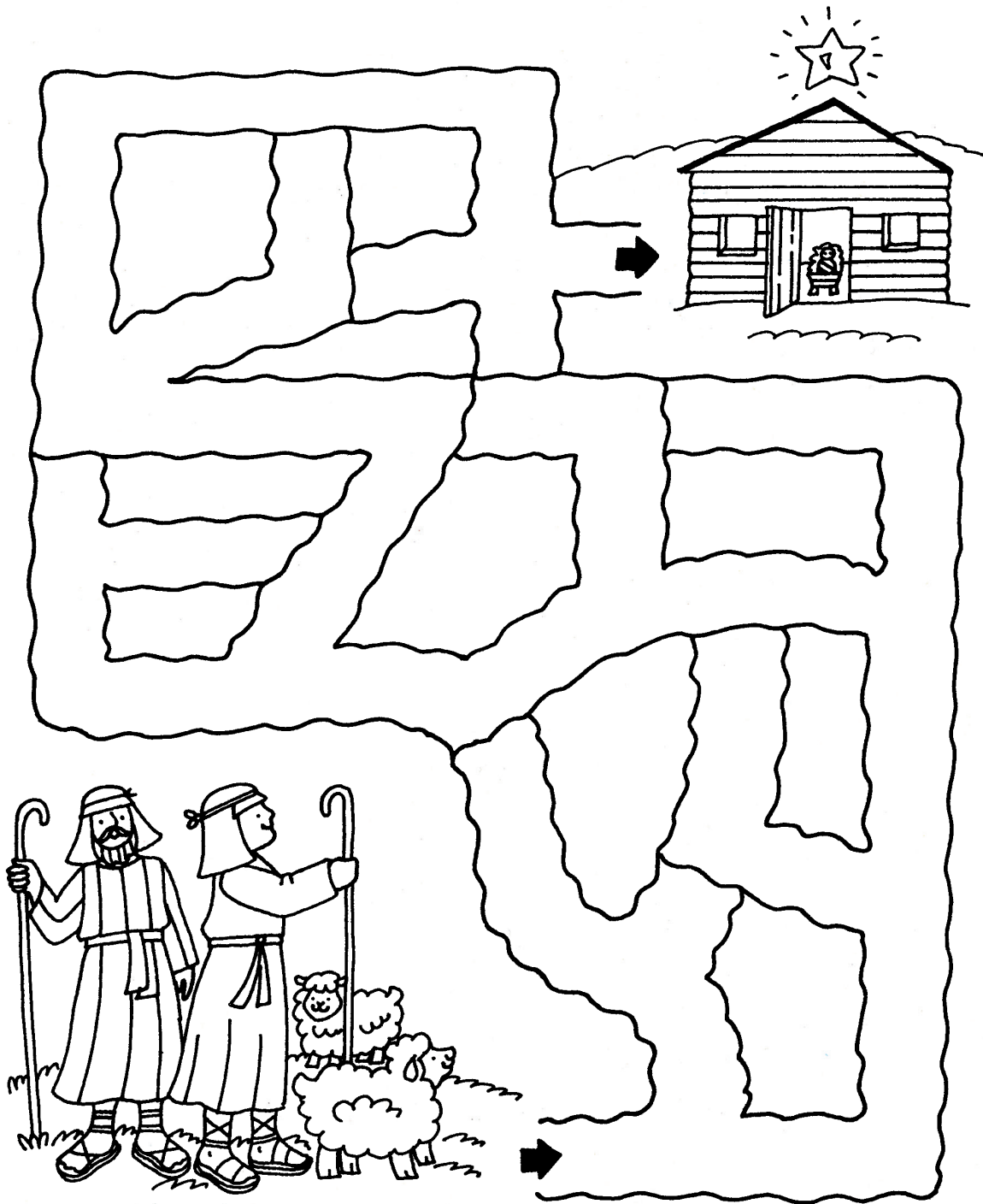
is a good reminder to us how important it is to have light when it's dark.

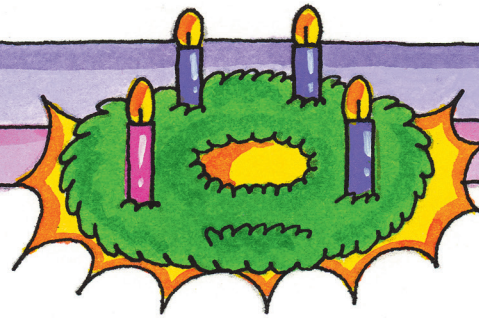


giving you a compliment when you're having a bad day. What are the things that help make your life brighter? What are ways you can make other's lives brighter? Write or draw them in the lights.

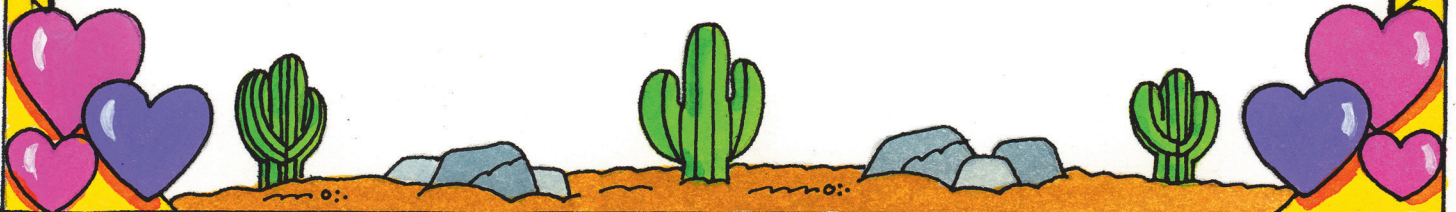

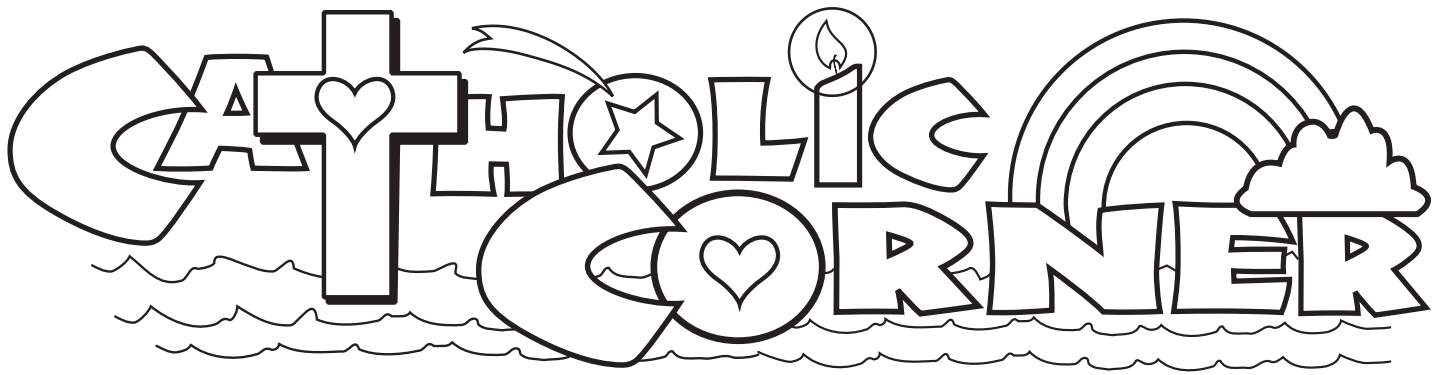

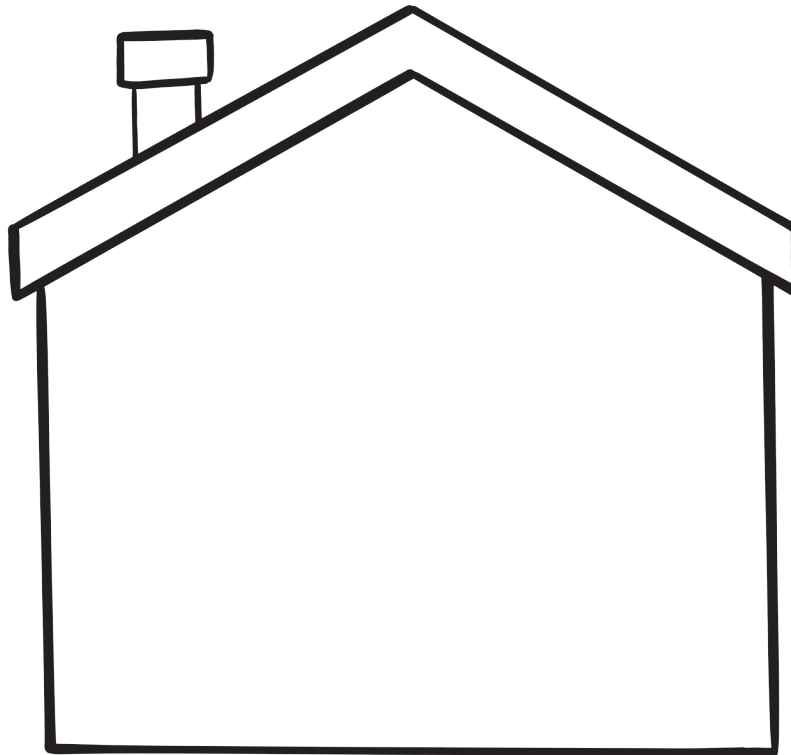


Together as a Family


Do you remember last week's readings? All the way back before Christmas, on the Fourth Sunday of Advent? Joseph had a dream where the angel of the Lord came to tell him everything was going to be okay and that he should still marry Mary. This week, Joseph keeps having dreams! Joseph learned pretty quickly that when God talks to him in a dream, he probably ought to listen.

In this gospel, Jesus has been born, but King Herod is looking for him. King Herod thinks that the baby Jesus will be the new king, and he doesn't want anyone else to be king. So in Joseph's dream, God tells him that he needs to take Jesus and Mary and leave. They have to go to a totally different place to live for a while. And even though Joseph was probably scared like he was in last Sunday's gospel, God is there to help take care of their family during a difficult time. God made sure that Joseph and Mary knew what they needed to do to make sure everyone was safe, happy and healthy.

Families face all kinds of hard things. Some families, like Joseph, Jesus, and Mary, have to leave their home because they aren't safe. It can be tricky—especially for moms and dads—to figure out what is the best thing for their family. Maybe it's something little—like what to cook for dinner that everyone likes. Or maybe it's something bigger—like moving somewhere new. Families have to figure out all kinds of decisions. But we can see from the Holy Family that two things remain really important no matter what—God is always there for us when we aren't sure what to do, and the most important thing about a family is that you are a family. Whether they were in Bethlehem, Egypt, or Nazareth, Joseph, Mary, and Jesus were still a family. And no matter where they went, God was always going to be with them. No matter what our family looks like or where our family might live, God will be with our families.
