Practicing Family Values

o we have to go to
Grandma's?" Children aren't
the only ones who sometimes
dread the family Christmas gathering.
Adults might, too. Why is that? Our
family is the cradle that embraced us at
birth, nourished us, and helped us grow.
At least that's what it was supposed to
be. Perhaps we didn't come from such a
family. Still, when our time comes, it is
within our power to form such a family.
How are we to do it?

In today's readings, we have two quite different descriptions of family

Sunday Readings

Sirach 3:2-6, 12-14

Those who respect their father will live a long life; those who obey the Lord honor their mother.

Colossians 3:12-21 or 3:12-17

Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience.

Matthew 2:13-15, 19-23

The angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Rise, take the child and his mother, flee to Egypt."

dynamics. The first, from Sirach, focuses on children's respect for and support of parents. Then, the gospel recounts parents' protection of a vulnerable child. Together, these readings tell us that every family member, regardless of age or position within the family, owes all the other members concern and care. Paul provides a short list of what I like to think of as genuine family values: "heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another" (Colossians 3:12–13). Are such values asking too much of us?


It's not by accident that we celebrate the feast of the Holy Family during Christmastime. Some think that this is a season for children. It's actually a season for family, a time when generations—three, sometimes four or five—at least contact each other. It's a time for us to decide whether or not Paul's list of virtues reflects our own family portrait. How authentic are our smiles? How deep are our family values? †

ncient household codes of conduct are found in the Book of Sirach and the Letter to the Colossians, each stipulating the appropriate behavior of family members. Sirach states that children are to honor their parents, especially their father, in a patriarchal culture. Colossians presents the virtues—compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, patience, love—that are required for community family life. In either case, the codes are meant to keep people on the narrow way to eternal life. Unique to Matthew's Gospel is the account of the trip of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph to Egypt to escape King Herod's wrath. Joseph receives directions from God through dreams. After the Magi, who have been guided by a star, depart Bethlehem, the Holy Family moves to Egypt. Because Matthew understands Jesus as a new Moses, Jesus' parents must take him to Egypt, from which he returns, as his name suggests, to save his people from their sins, like Moses saved his people from slavery.

Both household codes of conduct and dream revelations are biblical framers of family life. While household codes have changed, family members still need guidelines for living together in peace. These codes may be as detailed as curfews for teenagers and bedtimes for children. Likewise, family members still need to practice the virtues of compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, patience, and love to ensure peace in the household. All this can be held together by a vision, a dream, of what the family can be; this vision guides decisions concerning household codes and the practice of virtues. †

Wisdom from Catholic Update

From "In the Words of Henri Nouwen: How to Live a Happier, More Fulfilled Life" If you want to be a better friend, spouse, or parent, practice the discipline of generosity. The word "generosity," from the Latin *genus* and the Greek *genos*, refers to our being of one kind. Generosity is giving that comes from the knowledge of that intimate bond. True generosity is acting on the truth—not the feeling—that those I am asked to forgive are "kinfolk" and belong to my family. And allow yourself to be forgiven. In forgiving, we are still in control: "I forgive you," we say. But to seek forgiveness is to put yourself in a vulnerable position. You have to say, "I am sorry I failed you. I am sorry that I wasn't the kind of mother or father or friend or brother or sister or neighbor that I wanted to be. Can you forgive me?"
